A Sneak Preview

The Site Located just a quick 10 minutes off I-80 in Truckee, CA 'The Ranch' is a beautiful valley surrounded by towering mountains. Large pines, aspens and willows frame the edges of the meadows. Charming Prosser Creek meanders the entire length of the valley floor snaking its way through the grassy meadows. Rig access is ample and campsites plenteous.

The Course. Views from the ridge tops are stunning and the footing is good. The start is a 400 yard, wide open, grassy meadow which curves around the 'spectator friendly' crewing/vet check area before it merges with a dirt road and onto loop 1. It is a Ride & Tie start made in heaven! The course has 3 loops all returning to the 'starting meadow' for designated vet checks and holds. An extra little treat... aid stations, primarily for the runners, will be positioned midway on each loop. Aid stations offer water, Gatorade, fruit, sweet & salty 'nibblies', and horse water troughs.

The Awards. Custom buckles will be awarded to finishers of the 35 mile R&T Championship, 35 mile trail run, and 50 mile endurance ride. Embroidered horse blankets will be awarded to 'Best Conditioned' horse of the 35 Mile R&T Championship and 50 mile endurance ride. Top Ten finishers will also receive a customized halters, NaturalGlo, and subscriptions to Endurance World magazine. Sportack gift certificates totaling \$1200 will be awarded to 18-31 place of the 35 mile R&T Championship man/man, man/woman, woman/woman divisions. Additional awards can be previewed on the R&T website.

More Loot. Many generously donated items, such as, saddles, tack, heart monitors, boots, books, artwork, etc will be included in the raffle and silent auction allowing everyone a chance to get in on the loot.

The Party. The pre-buffet 'Margarita Party' will get things moving in a different direction. Margaritas, beer and sodas along with taquitos, chips, fresh salsa, and guacamole will help to hold you over until dinner - a professionally catered all-you-can-eat 'Tex-Mex' buffet. The awards presentations commence thereafter followed by dancing and mucho mas fiesta. Ole!

What else? A top-notch vetting staff, key volunteers organized and prepared to ensure your good time, 'reduced' entry fees, and a variety of recreational options in the vicinity.

are still long and hot. Let's face it..... 100 miles.... IS

Approximately 20-30% of your weekly mileage should be a long run. For example, if you run 40 miles per week, 8-12 miles of it should be a long run. Run it about 1.5 minutes per mile slower than your 10K race pace (in other words, you should be able to talk while you run!) Follow this long run with a day of rest or cross-training. Build up to a long run of about 2 to 2.5 hours two weeks before the race. Taper off your distances during these final two weeks.

First Time.... the hard way

About 10 years ago Marty McCowen was training for a Ride & Tie at Davenport. The horse came up lame and she did not get to go.

In April Marty was asked to be Judy Haulman's partner at the May 5 Quicksilver Ride & Tie. She decided to go.....and GO she did.

Marty is a splendid runner and at ease horseback. Keeping in shape is a way-of-life for her and husband Earl (he is one hecka Mountain Bike rider and has been taking some great photographs at recent Ride & Ties).

With only 3 weeks to go, Marty "upped" her own running and riding and along with Earl went to the Quicksilver Park to run the trail. The following weekend on Saturday they traveled to Foresthill to meet "Oby Boy" (Judy's horse) and on Sunday Marty did a practice ride & tie at the Quicksilver park with

Cheryl Domnitch and her horse, Mocha. At this point Marty was cautioned by her partner not to over-train.

Regarding the other members of the team: Judy sites her running ability as "truly NOT being able to get out of my own way" and the horse is a 22 year old, 16 hand, Polish Arab who has spent his whole life as a cow-horse (he is on first name basis with John Lyons!). Marty had her work cut out for her.

Race day arrived and the trio overcame their nervousness enough to do a fair job of riding and tying the first 5 mile loop. Meeting up at the base of "cardiac" (for the 2nd time) Judy was giving the horse a break and Marty said she would just keep walking. Marty took on ALL of Cardiac as Judy brought Oby along moderately. Unable to catch her partner by the top of Cardiac, Judy gave many of the pre-arranged "war whoops" for communication and Marty held up to see what was going on. Marty took the horse on a ways, tied, and ran off easily on the down-sloping trail. Judy's years of competitive riding told her this part of the trail would be a hard one for the horse who was always being termed "stiff behind" by vets and shoers. The one thing that could happen due to Oby's inexperience and age was for him to become legweary, so care was taken to slow the pace to what was good for the horse. Finally catching Marty again about 4 miles from the finish, Judy passed the horse to her partner and instructed her to tie in about half a mile and take the water bottle as the horse would not be catching up to her again til the finish line.

And so it was, Marty at the finish waiting about 15 minutes for Judy and Oby to arrive. The goal had been accomplished......Marty did her 1st Ride & Tie and got a few lessons in the logistics of the sport; Judy did her last Ride & Tie (yeah, she said that 5 years ago when she partnered with Heidi Agler and used her 22 year old Appaloosa); and Oby had the amazing adventure at 22 of doing his 1st Ride and Tie, going further, faster than he ever had before and coming out of it just fine.

To Marty: Welcome to the Family of Ride & Tie!

To Oby: Enjoy retirement (again!)

To Judy: Find a much younger, faster, shorter horse!!

Calculating A Horse's Weight Without a Scale

If you can't seem to get your equine ride & tie partner to balance on the 4 bathroom scales your borrowed from your neighbors, check this out: Weight (lbs.) = $G^2 * L/300$ where G = Measure girth circumference in inches measured just behind the elbow and over the withers and L = Measure from point of shoulder to point of buttocks (not yours, your horse's!)

Come rain or come shine! from Jean Heishman

Last minute scrambling due to weather influences made this year's ride & Tie just as interesting as last years. Spring rains dampened the base camp to the extent that the camp was moved about 4 miles down the road to lovely "Camelot", owned by Virginia Ingram.

This would not have posed a problem, except for the fact that a 12 mile ride & tie course could not easily be conceived from this location. Thanks to Larry Heishman for the use of his barns and parking area, the participants all trailered over to his place for the start on Saturday morning. A slight undercurrent of grumbling was perceived, but thanks to Bob Heltibridle's trailering service

from Virginia's to Larry's, this was dispelled quickly.

The 55 milers started off at 6:30am in the cool, brisk morning. They started slowly, with groans from some of the volunteers that it looked like they were planning on being out on the course ALL DAY!

The lone 30 mile team started 4 hours later with the 12 mile teams. The idea was that the 30 mile team would have company from the 12 milers for the first 6.5 miles and then if calculations were accurate, hopefully the 55 mile teams would join up with the 30 miler for their last 23.5 miles or so. This plan appeared as if it might work. As the 55 milers neared the point where the 30 miler team split from the 12 milers they encountered one 12 mile team after another. The 12 milers were traveling fast and looked as if they had paired up with competing teams.

First the 55 milers saw the two top 12 mile teams battling it out neck and neck. Next came the 3rd and 4th place teams. They too were close. Finally, the last two 12 mile teams rounded the corner. They were traveling fairly fast themselves, but still took the time to shout a greeting and give the 55 milers smiles of encouragement.

The 30 mile team must have been traveling at a good pace that never slacked up as 8 miles later at the vet check they were reportedly 30-45 minutes ahead of the 55 milers and by the time they finished they were just a little over an hour ahead of the 55 milers.

Several of the 12 mile teams took a few wrong turns and put in a little extra mileage. Everyone finished with smiles and not a single complaint was heard, even after the 12 milers were informed their course was actually closer to 15 miles!


