I've done a couple of practice Ride & Tie's, and one Endurance ride. Plus, I have my own Hunter/Jumper Thoroughbred. I know that horses, no matter how well you think know them, are ultimately unpredictable. No matter what the sport, if you involve horses, it can get a little crazy sometimes. So when I'm standing



at the start line of my first R&T and there are horses prancing around, rearing and some trying to flee back to the horse trailer they came here on, I'm not at all fazed. Instead, I'm checking out the competition as I would at any type of race. Immediately I'm intimidated by the very fit, very experienced looking Ride & Tie-ers. #### EAST COAST RACES FILL UP By Lani Newcomb, D.V.M.

Well, not actually, but our 2005 race schedule is rounding out nicely. Here is a brief summary of our events so you Westerners can pick which one(s) you'd like to attend. It's time for you all to broaden your horizons, come out of the sand, rocks and dust and see how much fun humidity and precipitation can be!

--Our first event is a new one, held in conjunction with a long-standing competitive ride. The Chesapeake 15/30 mile R&T will be held March 26 in Fair Hill, MD and promises rolling wooded hills, lots of water, good footing and cool temperatures. Or if it rains it might be slippery and a bit chilly but hey, you won't get overheated! --The No Frills 30/55 mile R&T on April 9 in Star Tannery, VA is one of the prettiest rides you'll ever do. Long rolling views of mountain tops all the way west to Ohio (if you have really good eyesight and squint just a little) and east to the Washington Monument (if you're sucker enough to believe the local mule riders), although getting there does involve a few rocky scrambles. Ride management is excellent and there's lots of cheerful encouragement from the AERC riders.

--The Bear Swamp 5/10/20 mile R&T held near Ithaca, NY on Sunday June 5 is a stand-alone event, running through rolling forest land and populated by a cheery enthusiastic management team. The weather in Upstate New York in June is about as fine as you'll ever see.

- All Kidding Aside 12/25/50 mile R&T on August 27 in Central Ohio, this event is held with a NATRC ride (lots of moral support!) on fairly flat terrain in lush woods. "Lush woods" in the east translates as "lot's o' poison ivy" - our crew comes down with a whomping case of it every year just from handling the tie rope. Oops. The weather here could be hot, but it's almost all in the woods and there are many creeks to cool off in.

-The Big South Fork 10/30/50 mile R&T near Knoxville, TN on September 10 is a definite must-do. Management is superb and the trails are gorgeous with rolling hills and frequent water crossings. There is something for everyone - for you Westerners they even have sand, rattlesnakes on the trail, bees and the occasional big cat. The AERC riders are always very supportive, especially as several of them do the R&T one day and the 50 mile AERC the next.

--Our final event is the Fort Valley 12/30/55 mile R&Ts on both October 22 and 23 near Front Royal, VA. This falls during peak east coast leaf peeping season and the views from the mountain tops are terrific, as is splashing in the Shenandoah River and jogging along the grassy logging trails. There are quite a few rocks, but you learn to work around them; weather can range from the perfect 70's to, well, ahem, snow and sleet on an off year. The AERC riders here have been weaving in and out of the R&Ters for many years now and view us as an essential part of the experience. For the truly dedicated, this is an opportunity to do the 50 mile R&T both Saturday and Sunday.

Plan a trip to the east this year and see what we have to offer! # POINT STANDINGS for 2004

#### SYSTEM FOR AWARDING POINTS

Points are awarded in all sanctioned events using the following formulae: INDIVIDUAL POINTS: 25 points for entering an event + 0.5 points for each completed mile + 3 points for each team you beat to the finish line (i.e. if ten teams finished the event and you finished first, you and your team would receive  $9\times 3=27$  place points). In the case of DNF (Did Not Finish) each Person and Horse get 25 points, for just entering. No miles points are awarded and the "team" gets 0 points for that race.

TEAM POINTS: 25 points for entering an event + 0.5 miles for each completed mile + 3 points for each team in your division (Man/Man,Man/Woman or Woman/Woman) which you beat to the finish line. In the case of DNF (Did Not Finish) no miles points are awarded and the team gets 0 points for that race. There are no team points awarded for Pro-Am events.

down a little. My heart is pounding through my chest still, as my body desperately tries to warm up and shake off pre-race nerves. Somewhere in the back my mind I'm nervous about getting my foot caught in the stirrup and getting dragged, or making a wrong turn and never seeing my partners again. And then there is the competitive side of me really doesn't want to finish last...

We make our first switch without much hassle. My pounding heart happy to jump on Findefar and my brain still trying to figure out why one would get off a perfectly good horse and away from it?

Carol and I have agreed that she will lead the ride, meaning she will make all of the ties and therefore always stay ahead. We also agreed that I would hand the horse off to her rather than tie. This is great for me as it alleviates the pressure of me making a bad tie or messing up our timing. Quickly I learned I needed to unlearn traditional "Pony Club" rules, for example, never get off your horse on the right side. Oh, and posting properly at the trot became more of a game of survival than trying to look pretty and proper! As the race progresses, I realize that this really isn't a nice long run, its more like doing 1 mile long intervals for 13 miles and is going to be a lot harder that I thought. In between looking ahead for my 4-legged partner, trying not to make a wrong turn and wishing I would've done more training runs, I take more notice the competition. It becomes very clear to me that there are 2 things that make the top competitors in the sport. 1) PRACTICE (with your horse and partner preferably) and 2) EXPERIENCE. If you can't get on your horse or waste valuable time trying to untie, well, it doesn't matter how fast you run or how fit your horse is.

Experienced R&T-ers are communicating about how they are doing, how the horse is doing, etc.; adjusting race strategy as needed throughout the race. Additionally, they are the one whose horses are ready to race, pretty well behaved, yet competitive. The experienced riders make good and fast ties and unties (unlike yours truly who actually let the horse get loose during the race! Yikes!); and are on and off fast. Their horses and the runners are fit too. Additionally, they have experienced crew that assists them in a quick and efficient Vet Check. All of this adds up to a top race time, a healthy, sound horse and running partners crossing the finish line all together - which to me, as competitive as I sometimes can be, is the most important goal and greatest accomplishment!

If you can find an experienced R&T-er to teach you the ropes – I urge you to try it out!

The whole experience is a blast! There nothing like running up to your new horsey friend and having them nicker at you to come untie them! A truly encouraging and touching sound! They are smart, fun, fast and competitive teammates to have! Although they won't hug you at the finish line, they'll be sure to give you a nudge to let you know they're happy with your performance!
